Dear Colleagues,

I am writing to ask you to consider nominating me for Vice President.

Education is in crisis. Chronic underfunding has pushed us to breaking point. We are no longer only educators, we are counsellors, SEN specialists, social workers and more - stretched thinner every year, with fewer resources and larger class sizes.

The toxic assessment system does nothing to raise standards, while Ofsted and academisation continue to strip away our professional autonomy and dignity. Despite all this, we know our power. We are half a million strong: when we stand together, we are unstoppable.



I've spent over twenty years in education, beginning as a member of support staff in a special school before becoming a primary teacher, then working in PRUs. Wherever I've worked, I've always stood up as a rep to fight injustices and defend colleagues – always refusing to accept the erosion of our rights.

For the past two and a half years, I've been proud to serve as Joint Branch and District Secretary for Hull. In that time, I've worked relentlessly to rebuild and re-energise our local union: growing our network of active reps, creating spaces for members to connect and lead, and ensuring that our collective voice is heard loud and clear. Our WhatsApp groups and meetings have become the beating heart of our movement in Hull – spaces full of solidarity, laughter, sometimes frustration, but always, spaces to build for action.

Together, we've led and won disputes on workload, on violence against staff, on redundancies. When members took strike action for the first time at a Hull school, they forced a toxic headteacher to resign. That victory wasn't just about one school it showed what happens when we stand up and fight back. We've negotiated major local wins too - from scrapping performance-related pay, to pushing for fairer pay structures across our academies, and securing increased facilities time so we can better support our growing membership.

As Vice President, I would bring that same passion, energy, and commitment to our national union. I believe in our lay-led strength: activism is home grown through our Districts, Branches, Reps, Organising forums, and through empowering members. Our leaders must come from the rank-and-file - from those that work alongside us every day to ensure that decisions are grounded in real experiences and shared challenges: not from behind the desks of those that do not share our terms and conditions, not from those that do not have the lived experience of the struggle facing those in education.

Our support staff membership has exploded, despite us being blocked from active recruitment by the TUC. I believe that we must build on that energy and momentum. We must fight for recognition, resist job creep and demand equal standing with other support staff unions to secure the pay and conditions our members deserve. To become one union for all education workers, we must stand together and take this fight nationally.

Schools struggle to afford basic resources, support staff are paid poverty wages, teachers are leaving in droves. Meanwhile it's business as usual for academy CEOs and other trust leaders who continue to cash in. Public money meant for children's education is being siphoned off into bulging private pockets. It is greed at the heart of the marketisation of education. I believe that we must be a union that fights unapologetically for justice and demand salary caps for Trust CEOs and full financial transparency from every academy trust. Education must once again serve the public — not the profit margins of bloated trust boards and executive teams. Renationalise education, rebuild public accountability, and put learning before profit.

Our workplaces are under attack from an onslaught of punitive accountability measures, real-terms cuts to pay and funding, and crushing of creativity and autonomy. Another education system is possible and must start with the building of an NEU which can make a material, visible difference to the working lives of our members, by organising in our workplaces and our communities. We can and must rise to the reactionary challenges we face from government and the far right.

I am a Teacher of English and have been a school rep across Catholic and state schools since my first year in teaching 18 years ago. In my first school I built a union group from three members to thirty and saw how this can transform a school for both those who work there, and our students. I also have experience of the leadership side of school life and advocating for NEU policies in leadership.

I have been the district and branch secretary of Croydon NEU since 2019. In that time our core team has been built from three to eight, as we have won increased facilities time despite a bankrupt LA and a very small number of LA schools. Our district committee has grown from ten to twenty-five, allowing us to build outward facing and well attended general meetings. Our central focus is on reps- we recruit them, we train them, we engage them in the district, and we urge them to launch disputes- most of which are resolved in members' favour before strike action is necessary. In keeping with my belief in a lay-led union, I create and share our own model materials for reps.

As educators, we are part of working class communities and listen to them- including the dissatisfied. We are well placed to help our communities fight back, linking struggles together and taking on vested interests- building the schools we deserve where all are welcome, including refugees and asylum seekers. The NEU's work taking on the far right has been impressive- I will work to broaden and deepen it.

In our classrooms, we seek to create an environment of equity. The NEU has a key role in seeking to project that environment into the whole education system and ultimately, the whole of society. We work to collectivise the struggles for equality, to make these central workplace issues. I will help to lead a grassroots push to embed the toolkits we have and make them a living reality for members.

The NEU has a proud record of support for international solidarity, and I stand in that tradition. The Palestine movement is a ray of hope in a dark political world, and the NEU needs to remain central to that campaign, and to our other priority international campaigns.
